But we're all in masks, which is a reminder that it has been just over a year since the global pandemic was declared. And while the death toll has been tragic, there is hope on the horizon as more and more people receive their COVID vaccines.

Your local AALAS branch has been hanging in there for the past year; if you haven't renewed your branch membership, now is the time. Many branches continue to offer monthly webinars and lecture series as they adhere to their commitment to uphold AALAS' mission of advancing responsible laboratory animal care and use to benefit people and animals. Please check your branch's newsletter or social media posts for upcoming events.

The AALAS national office has continued to be able to support the laboratory animal community, as I learned at the BOT Winter Session:

- AALAS's financial health is solid. Even though we finished 2020 with a deficit due to reduced income related to the
 pandemic, we were able to cover that deficit with a budget excess from 2019 and by participating in the federal
 Paycheck Protection Program. I'd like to express my appreciation for our Executive Director Dr. Ann Turner and the
 rest of the AALAS office for their dedication to ensuring the financial health of AALAS.
- AALAS membership also continues to be strong, having surpassed 15,000 members at the end of 2020.
- Looking for information on the latest LAS products and technology? Learn from 36 LAS industry experts at AALAS' first-ever Demo Day. This free event takes place April 27-29. Each day will have a morning and afternoon session. Sessions will run from 10 AM CT to Noon CT and then from 1 PM CT until 3 PM CT on each of the three days. Experts in the field will present information in 15-minute segments followed by a 5 minute Q&A where attendees can ask questions and interact with presenters.
- The BOT Liaisons for each standing committee summarized their committee's recent activities and ongoing goals.
 Everyone has been busy! The BOT approved the proposed 2022 Chairs for these committees, as well as the Vice-Chair for the 2022 National Meeting Program Committee.
- The BOT approved a motion to waive the 2021 AALAS National Meeting registration for the winners of the International Council for Laboratory Animal Science (ICLAS) Americas Regional Committee Travel Award. More information about this award is available here.
- Speaking of the 2021 AALAS National Meeting, it is still scheduled to take place in Kansas City, Missouri. The meeting will be both virtual and on-site. The on-site registration will include the virtual platform. The topic submission deadline was March 15, but the platform presentation deadline is open until June 1. I will have an update after the BOT Summer Session, which is scheduled for early August. In the meantime, be on the lookout for announcements from AALAS as well as posts in the AALAS Community Exchange (ACE).

Please stay safe and well as we move into our second year of the pandemic. I'm sure that you share my hope that COVID-19 case counts, hospitalizations, and deaths decline as vaccinations increase. Welcome to the latest Impact Update for Carolina, your adopted HeroRAT!



April proved to be another busy month for Carolina and her clever nose! While sniffing through 1,730 samples, she detected an additional 40 cases of tuberculosis (TB) with an accuracy rate of 79%.

Since the launch of APOPO
TB detection program in
Tanzania in 2007, HeroRATs
have screened over **500,000**samples.


APOPO TB PROGRAM ADDS A NEW PARTNER CLINIC



Dr. Georgies Mgode, Program Manager for APOPO TB Tanzania, announced a new partnership, launched April 12th, between APOPO and Kigogo Health Centre located in Dar es Salaam. This latest partnership will see HeroRATs like Carolina screening samples that may have undetected cases of tuberculosis.

Working alongside the Kigogo Health Centre staff, APOPO will enhance access to more patients as we widen our geographic coverage in the city. It is estimated that each case of tuberculosis caught and treated can prevent the spread of disease to up to 15 additional people.

HERORATS HELPING OVERWHELMED CLINICS

With more countries taking the threat TB seriously, people have been better educated through campaigns and word of mouth. But this increase in awareness has had unintended consequences; local hospitals and clinics are now overwhelmed with suspected cases of TB. In many cases, these facilities lack both adequate staff and modern equipment to meet the needs for testing sputum samples.

It's because of these limitations that many sick people are misdiagnosed. That's where HeroRATs like Carolina are stepping in to help. After the HeroRATs indicate a TB-positive sample, the diagnosis is confirmed with World Health Organization endorsed methods. APOPO notifies the clinic within 24 hours so that patient can begin immediate treatment.



Dr. Joyce Mgohamweni, the Clinical Officer and District Tuberculosis and Leprosy Coordinator for Mbagala-Rangi Tatu District in Dar es Salaam, was skeptical when she heard that rats could help diagnose tuberculosis. But, over time, she saw that APOPO helped increased detection rates of clinics in Tanzania by 35%. That's over 10,000 people since 2011 who otherwise would probably have died without treatment.

"I was very sceptical about using rats at first. It sounded silly to me," said Dr. Mgohamweni.
"But APOPO now account for a good percentage of our monthly TB results... What we must remember is that if people get correctly diagnosed on time, TB is entirely curable. I am grateful that APOPO are here supporting us."


