

# Welcome to the latest Impact Update for Carolina, your adopted HeroRAT!



During the month of July, Carolina put her nose to work and sniffed through **1,670 samples** brought in from local clinics. She helped to identify **31 additional cases of tuberculosis** (TB) with an **83% accuracy rate**.

The spread of Covid-19 remains a concern in Tanzania; all APOPO staff are adhering to recommended safety protocols, including wearing masks and limiting the number of people in laboratory spaces. It is because of our donors support that we are able to continue helping those suffering from tuberculosis during the ongoing global pandemic.



Though Carolina weighs less than a half-gallon of milk, her powerful nose has helped save hundreds of lives.



## **HeroRAT Update**

### **Catching up with Carolina**



When Maria's husband became sick, she held their family together, caring for him and their 4 children. Now infected with tuberculosis herself, Maria was in pain and weakened. HeroRATs like Carolina checked Maria's sample and confirmed her positive test by detecting the tuberculosis bacteria immediately. Within 24 hours, APOPO had contacted her clinic and so that Maria could get started on antibiotics and begin to feel better.

Tuberculosis places a heavy burden on families. In places like Tanzania, the women of the home often care for the household, the children, and several members of the extended family. ### HONORING THE LIFE OF DR. GEORGIES MGODE



In July, the entire APOPO team was saddened but the unexpected passing of our colleague and Tuberculosis Program Manager, the esteemed Dr. Georgies Mgode.

Dr Mgode was among the pioneer researchers of tuberculosis detection using rats; in 2012 Dr. Mgode was awarded the presidential Medal of Invention and Scientific Research by H.E. Jakaya Mrisho Kikwete, President of Tanzania, for his novel research on TB diagnosis. Georgies worked tirelessly to expand APOPO's reach in TB diagnosis and build strong and trusted relationships within the health sector.

Georgies is remembered as a brilliant and kind man who devoted his life to helping those sick and vulnerable by helping expand access to accurate diagnosis and, in turn, faster access to treatment.
