


HOLIDAY GIFT

CATCHING UP WITH DISTRICT 8

AALAS D8 TRUSTEE MESSAGE - FALL 2021

It was such a pleasure to see so many of you in Kansas City at the 72nd National Meeting! The overall feeling was that, while this meeting was much smaller than our usual National Meetings, it made for more intimate and personal connections, and it was a great step in returning to normal business. Overall attendance was 1669 in-person and another 1061 virtual, with 170 exhibitors in attendance. And while we still had to meet all of our hotel and conference commitments, AALAS is still in good financial standing, and we were thrilled to continue to deliver an excellent meeting with high-quality presentations and meaningful connections.

The Board of Trustees met immediately prior to the start of the meeting and received a number of updates that reflected the health of AALAS as an organization. Membership has climbed to over 15,300 members worldwide. Committees continue to convene in order to serve the lab animal community. In fact, the Institute for Laboratory Animal Management (ILAM) resumed in-person leadership development in August, with 96 students. And the AALAS office has been at work reimagining how digital content can be delivered in a more effective and streamlined manner, including podcasts, e-books, and a new AALAS website. Look for updates to the "digital hub" as they become available.

The BOT also approved a number of action resolutions:

- Texas Society for Biomedical Research approved as an affiliate
- Survey from the Veterinary Consortium for Research Animal Care and Welfare approved for posting on ACE
- Dr Thomas Meier reappointed to as AALAS representative to AAALAC International
- Budget to update AALAS website approved
- 2022 budget approved
- Dr. Deb Hickman appointed to AALAS Foundation Board of Directors.

My experience at the past AALAS National Meeting has reminded me of the importance of direct, person-to-person connections. As we continue to move through the pandemic, I hope to see your branches resuming inperson gatherings and events. With appropriate precautions in place, these events can be a source of nourishment for our communities. I hope to attend as many of these functions as I am able.



HeroRAT Update

Catching up with Carolina

Welcome to the latest Impact Update for Carolina, your adopted HeroRAT!



Clever Carolina continued sniffing out new cases of tuberculosis through November. After checking 1,340 samples, with an 84% accuracy rate, she alerted the APOPO lab staff to 14 additional cases of TB. Using WHO-endorsed methods to confirm those positive tests, APOPO then contacted the local clinic and those newly diagnosed cases were called back in to start immediate treatment.

In many developing countries, TB is still detected through sputum microscopy, a method dating back over 130 years. This method works best in cases with a high bacterial load, which is a sign of advanced disease. However, its sensitivity is poor among children and people living with HIV.

SUPPORT FOR TB TANZANIA TO PARTNER WITH MORE CLINICS



During November, the APOPO TB team in Dar es Salaam welcomed First Counsellor from the Embassy of the Republic of Poland Ms. Katarzyna Sobiecka. The First Counsellor toured the APOPO detection rat research facility and discussed the progress made, as well as the challenges faced and opportunities created. Also in attendance was APOPO's community based organization partner MKUTA.

In August, APOPO received a grant from the Polish government for our project to use innovative TB detection rats and community action to find and treat TB-patients in Dar es Salaam from August to December 2021.

APOPO's project success can be summarized as building on two strong pillars: an integrated approach between partners reaching out to communities with a strong linkage-to-care component, and the very short turn-around time of less than 24h between diagnostics and the start of treatment. APOPO was thrilled to share that the progress has exceeded expectations and APOPO hopes this will lead to further discussions on the possibility of extending this project in 2022.


