




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HeroRAT UPDATE

Your HeroRAT, Carolina, remains on her dedicated mission to detect cases of tuberculosis (TB) in Tanzania. Using her highly attuned sense of smell she carefully checked **2,004 samples** over the last month, with an **accuracy rate of 83.6%**, which allowed an additional 49 patients to be identified for vital tuberculosis

If left untreated, the mortality rate of TB disease is significant, at approximately 50%. However, of patients with access to the currently recommended treatment of a 6-month course of anti-TB medication, around 85% of individuals are cured. So, Carolina's work is key to identifying missed cases of tuberculosis and saving lives.




Carolina continues to engage in exercise sessions held in shaded environments, allowing her ample space to play and explore. To make these sessions even more enjoyable, we have enriched her environment with a diverse range of items. These include custom-built running wheels, sand flooring, sisal ropes, tree branches, and wooden ramps and platforms. Carolina absolutely loves these enrichments, as they enable her to express her natural climbing, digging, and running behaviors.

We are delighted to share that Carolina's well-being is thriving, thanks to your generous support and dedication. The research conducted by a student intern revealed that her favorite activities include climbing on the branches, running on the wheels, and exploring the rock arrangements. These enrichments bring Carolina immense joy during her much-deserved downtime.

HeroRAT UPDATE

5 YEAR-OLD NILHAM'S JOURNEY TO HEALTH

In the battle against TB, APOPO's HeroRATs proved to be a beacon of hope for 5 year-old Nilham, who lives in Dar es Salaam with her Aunt and cousin. Concerned by her persistent cough, Nilham's Aunt, her main caretaker, sought medical assistance, leading them to the hospital. Her sputum sample came to APOPO and the HeroRATs detected TB in Nilham's sample that her clinic was unable to find, highlighting the extraordinary impact our team of tuberculosis detection rats, including Carolina, have in diagnosing the disease.



Guided by local healthcare professionals, Nilham embarked on a treatment plan supported by the government's provision of free medication. Over time, her condition has improved significantly, emphasizing the effectiveness of this collaborative effort. APOPO's unwavering dedication and the unique abilities of our HeroRATs offer a vital solution in regions where TB diagnosis can be challenging, underscoring the importance of their ongoing work.




