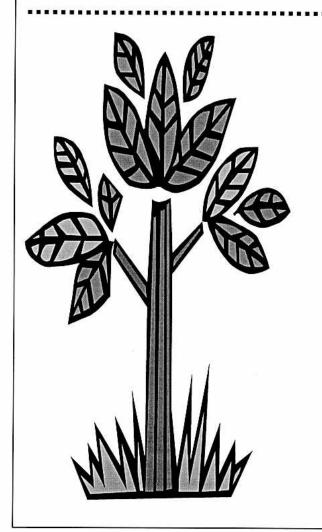

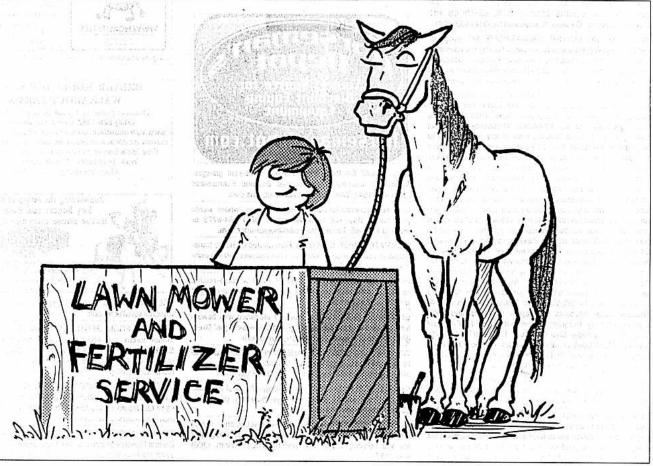

# Editorial **Promises to Keep (Part 1)**

This editorial speaks about a widespread and persistent issue with profound effects on animal resource programs. Although it consists of diverse and interactive elements, they fit in one way or another under the term "job satisfaction." I attempt here to paint job satisfaction in broad strokes—making the effort admittedly simplistic—to highlight its relevance particularly to animal care workers. The February 2004 editorial will air some ideas for confronting it, based on 25 years of experience at the helm of a large animal resource program. In that context, let me set what may be a familiar table.

Contemporary animal-based research is demanding new levels of performance, efficiency, and security in vivarium design and operation. The exhibit halls at the national AALAS meetings should convince even the most skeptical viewers that the modern tools and technologies that have been developed in response to the research environment are also transforming the form and practice of laboratory animal science. Emerging facilities are, as a result, more complex structurally and functionally, befitting the needs of their dazzling occupants: animals of seemingly endless genetic variety, often constitutionally finicky, and holding the potential for significant breakthroughs against human suffering and disease. Nevertheless, a venerable human activity-husbandry-remains at the heart of this technological transformation. No new equipment or technology can (or should) replace this essential interaction between laboratory animals and their human stewards. The demands of animalbased research dictate that this act be accomplished with virtually no tolerance for lapse or error, with intensified attention to related priorities such as health assessment, breeding, sanitation, disinfection, identification, and record keeping, and with comparably low financial compensation.

As a prime example, there is little doubt that caring for brimming populations of genetically engineered mice—gram for gram the scientific world's most valuable (and plentiful) mammals—is a great and expanding responsibility, that always has been encumbered by physical risks such as repetitive motion injury or allergy, which can obviously influence job satisfaction and performance. It seems to me, however, that the physical hazards are at least matched by psychological hurdles. Among the most daunting are task repetition and its stepchild, tedium. Performing mouse husbandry with skill and without error, cage

after cage, day after day, can eventually—and not surprisingly—dampen even the most enthusiastic attitude and raise job-related stress. Animal care workers are also subject to challenges to self-esteem. Among the leading causes, in my experience, is dismissive or condescending behavior from investigators, their laboratory personnel, and even their students and trainees. Similar buffeting can occur from derogatory attitudes and comments about an animal care worker's profession made in the workplace or in social settings by people ill-informed about the demands and benefits of animal-based research. Psychological stress also can arise de novo among staff members who do not understand the research for which animals under their care are being used, or who encounter experimental procedures on animals about which they have not been alerted.

As a final example, gaps between expectations and outcomes in job duties and career paths can be disheartening. All the recruiting acumen and on-the-job training in the world will count for little if job duties and responsibilities remain or become unrewarding intellectually, technically, or financially. This is an especially important consideration for AALAS training and certification, which implies that a staff member will have opportunities to apply new concepts and technologies.

While job satisfaction is a major factor in any work environment, it is set in bold relief for animal care workers by demands for consistently high performance to sustain highly valued living things. This observation holds as well for other staff members such as those responsible for washing centers and animal health care. The resource director rightfully expects that staff meet such standards, while staff rightfully expects a satisfying work environment imbued with opportunities for empowerment, diversity, and growth. The obvious payoffs for successful engagement of these complementary goals are stability, skill, reliability, and enthusiasm-attributes any animal resource staff should be happy to achieve. Therefore, the administration and staff of a progressive animal resource make a covenant committing both parties to deliver their respective "goods." However, the major responsibility for fostering conditions that promote job satisfaction rests primarily with the leadership. It is not any easy task to accomplish, but should be energized by substantive promises which must be kept.
