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

SMARTER FASTER BETTER

by Charles Duhigg: 2016 At the core of this book are eight key productivity concepts—from motivation and goal setting to focus and decision making—that explain why some people and companies get so much done. Drawing on the latest findings in

neuroscience, psychology, and behavioral economics, this painstakingly researched book explains that the most productive people don't merely act differently. They view the world, and their choices, in profoundly different ways.

MANAGER ROUNDTABLE RECAP

On January 18th, about 15 laboratory animal facility leaders gathered at Aptevo Therapeutics to discuss hot topics in facility and people management. Below is a summary of what was discussed.

KEEPING EMPLOYEES ENGAGED

This topic created a lot of discussion around strategies and tools for animal facility employee engagement. They included the following:

- Add variety. Employees get burnt out doing the same task day-in and day-out. Add variety by folding intra- and extra-facility tasks into the work. Cross-training was mentioned as an effective strategy.
- **Communication**. Ask employees what their goals are and help them to achieve their goals. Ask about their opinions to show you value their perspectives.
- **Incentives**. From ice cream, to gift cards, to public recognition from researchers, managers want employees to know when they are doing an outstanding job.
- **Project involvement**. Help your technicians get involved in projects they are interested in so they have an impact on outcomes.
- **Education**. Lunch & Learns were a favorite of the group. LAS vendors are often available for L&L's when in town. AALAS webinars were another suggestion. Once purchased, they can be replayed when convenient.

ANIMAL FACILITY STEPPING STONE

Is it a good thing when employees want to use the animal facility as a stepping stone to another position? Managers agreed that if expectations are set and communication is honest, an employee who wants to use the animal facility as a stepping stone to another position could be one of your most loyal employees. Examples were given where employees stayed **years** longer than anticipated because of a supportive manager. However, others noted that resources for a heavy investment in employees who transition out quickly are short in supply. This brought the group to discuss the importance of interviewing animal facility applicants. It is important to interview thoroughly and show applicants the work so you can gauge their reactions. Interviews are also an opportunity to set expectations and determine if they are ready to communicate with researchers.

UPDATING SOPS

Managers noted that they have all updated SOPs within the last few years. Many discussed best practices for creating and updating SOPs.

- **Crowdsource revisions**. Include the whole team in SOP revision to ensure they reflect current practices.
- Spot-check the process. Watch someone do the task and note where document revisions are needed.
- **Use images**. Sometimes words aren't easily understood. Use images to ensure everyone is on the same page with procedures.
- **SOPs are not good training documents**. Often SOPs are used as purely legal documents. Use them in conjunction with demonstrations of practices for higher quality training and retention. Create separate 'cheat-sheets' for techs that cut through the complicated verbiage.

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

DISTRICT 8 TRUSTEE REPORT

Greetings District 8 AALAS members,

I hope you all had a blast in Austin at the National AALAS meeting. We had a great attendance of over four thousand! While we were there the AALAS Board of Trustees (BOT) held our annual meeting. The full minutes from the meeting will be posted on the AALAS website under Leadership/BOT Minute Archive. We started off by approving additional support for the AAALAC International Fellowship Award by allowing the provision of housing at the AALAS National Meeting for the one fellowship recipient. We also approved our 2018 Operational and Capital Assets budgets and the appointment of Ms. Emily Slocum, Ms. Patricia Sikes, and Ms. Lisa Kelly as AALAS Foundation Board Directors-At-Large for three-year terms, 2018-2020.

AALAS BOT Representatives to the AALAS Foundation Board of Directors were approved for the duration of their Trustee terms: Stacy Cantrell (2019), Lindsay Holmes (2020). The BOT approved the disbandment of the National Meeting Site Review Committee (NMSRC) and transfer of its functions to staff. The AALAS Policies & Procedures Manual (PPM) will be revised accordingly.

In addition to this there has been a reworking for the use of the Ben Cohen Educational Funds. The funds will be used to provide training and resource identification in association management for branch leaders through a Management Summit. The Management Summit will be held at AALAS headquarters in Memphis March 23rd-25th. Each branch president will receive an invite to send on branch member to this event. The Ben Cohen funds will pay for on-site expenses (lodging, transportation, meals, and materials), branches will be responsible for the transportation to Memphis for their participant. COOKING WITH WBAALAS

CHOCOLATE STOUT CUPCAKES

Ingredients:

3/4 cup unsweetened cocoa
2 cups sugar
2 cups all-purpose flour
1 teaspoon baking soda
Pinch fine salt
1 bottle stout beer (recommended: Guinness)
1 stick butter, melted
1 tablespoon vanilla extract
3 large eggs
3/4 cup sour cream
1 (8-ounce) package room-temp cream cheese
3/4 to 1 cup heavy cream
1 (1-pound) box confectioners' sugar



Directions:

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F.

In a large mixing bowl, whisk together the cocoa, sugar, flour, baking soda, and salt.

In another medium mixing bowl, combine the stout, melted butter, and vanilla. Beat in eggs, 1 at time. Mix in sour cream until thoroughly combined and smooth. Gradually mix the dry ingredients into the wet mixture.

Lightly grease 24 muffin tins. Divide the batter equally between muffin tins, filling each 3/4 full. Bake for about 12 minutes and then rotate the pans. Bake another 12 to 13 minutes until risen, nicely domed, and set in the middle but still soft and tender. Cool before turning out.

To make the icing: In a medium bowl with a hand mixer, beat the cream cheese on medium speed until light and fluffy. Gradually beat in the heavy cream. On low speed, slowly mix in the confectioners' sugar until incorporated and smooth. Cover with plastic wrap and refrigerate until ready to use. Icing can be made several hours ahead and kept covered and chilled.

Top each cupcake with a heap of frosting and dust with cocoa.
